

## **Liberals question inaccurate briefing notes tabled in House**

St. John's — Liberal Leader Yvonne Jones asked Health Minister Ross Wiseman about the testimony of his deputy minister at the Cameron Inquiry during question period on Wednesday.

Assistant deputy minister of health, Moira Hennessey told the inquiry looking into inaccurate breast cancer tests on Tuesday, that some of her briefing notes were changed in 2006 without her consent and passed on to the minister of health at the time.

Jones asked Wiseman how that happened.

"She's on the stand as we speak," replied Wiseman. "She's due to be there again this afternoon, I believe. Mr. Speaker, I think it's important while she's giving her testimony, it's important to allow her that process to provide a full picture.

"When her testimony is completed then we'll have an opportunity to chat with her and others about the information that they did have," continued Wiseman.

But Jones said her question wasn't about the individual but about inaccurate information being tabled in the House through the briefing notes.

Wiseman said the process for signing off on briefing notes has changed since last year. He said briefing notes are now signed by a senior official and dated.
